### Principal's Update

## Be Prepared to Learn

Reminder to all students that they should be attending college prepared for the day. Standard equipment is 2 black pens, pencil, ruler, rubber, Casio FX-83GTPlus calculator and subject books, some lessons will require additional equipment.




## Have you got the Edge?

At The Henry Cort Community College we believe that it is important to recognise that school is not all about academic qualifications. While we want students to leave us with academic qualifications to enable them to go on to further academic or vocational studies, we recognise that education is also about equipping students with life skills that will help them to become happy well rounded individuals. In September last year, we introduced PixL Edge into the curriculum.

PixL Edge is a national scheme devised with a number of large employers. It is a framework to develop and accredit students with personal attributes which will equip them for employability and life. Those attributes are leadership, organisation, resilience, initiative and communication.

Students undertake a number of activities within each of these attributes and when they complete them they receive a rather splendid looking certificate to evidence their achievements. In secondary schools, there are 3 levels in which students can participate, beginning with Apprentice Level.




After running a small pilot scheme with Year 9 students last summer we decided to run the scheme for all of our Year 8 students from September and we have been amazed at their success.


