## Risk Assessments after injuries / operations

If your child is returning to school under these circumstances, for example after receiving an injury at the weekend or during a holiday, please contact the school in advance to arrange to meet Mrs Bunyan with your child on or before their return to school. If you have not had the opportunity to make an appointment, please come direct to the school office with your child in the morning before they go into class.

### Internet Safety Update

As you are probably aware, internet safety is already part of our computing curriculum, with regular reminders to the children about how to keep themselves safe online, but also, as they get older, being able to make informed choices about how they use information they find online, and about the need to 'fact check'. Some of you may have noticed that internet safety is also included in the new statutory guidance for health education which will become compulsory from September, underlying the importance of this issue for us all.


As parents, it can be hard to keep up with new apps and technology, or to know how and when to talk to your child about internet safety. I'm therefore pleased to be able to share with you another really useful resource available which has been signposted by one of our parents through the recent parent consultation on the new health, relationship and sex education guidance (thank you to whoever that was—I don't know as it was anonymous!)

NSPCC Net Aware is a free to use website resource which contains a multitude of useful and accessible information for parents. This section gives really helpful advice on how to start conversations with your children, whatever their age, and how to make sure that this becomes as natural a part of your parenting as teaching road safety.

### National Science Week

The second week of March is National Science Week and we are going to be marking this in school with a special science theme day on Wednesday 11th March. We have a special 'mix up' morning planned so that children in Y1-3 and Y4-6 will work in mixed age groups on a range of science activities. We are looking forward to being able to broaden their experiences and thinking outside the usual science curriculum (YR will also be having a science focus within their base).

On that day, we are also very excited to welcome Dr Emily Grossman into school to deliver her 'Weird and Wonderful Brain Fizzling Facts' show in two performances across the afternoon, which is based on her new book 'Brain Fizzling Facts: Awesome Science Questions Answered'. Dr Emily is best known as the resident science expert on the Alan Titchmarsh Show and 'Duck Quacks Don't Echo' on Sky1, but she is also an honorary STEM ambassador (alongside Tim Peake) and is a great role model as a woman in science.



Dr Emily is able to bring signed copies of her book from the publisher on the day which cost £7. A Parentmail form will come out shortly so that those that wish to order one for their child can do so in advance. However, if your child isn't worried about a signed copy, I've noticed that the book is on offer on Amazon at the moment for £5.10! (Please note, though, that we will not have the time on the day to be able to get books signed by the author so if you want them to have a signed copy, these will need to be pre-ordered via the Parentmail form and money sent on the day.)
