Equalities Information

We recognise that the public sector equality duty has three aims, to:

- eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation and other conduct under the Act
- advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not
- foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not

We have considered how well we currently achieve these aims with regard to the protected groups under the Equality Act (race, disability, sex, gender re-assignment, age, pregnancy and maternity, marriage and civil partnership, religion or belief and sexual orientation).

We have also involved staff, pupils, parents and others in the following ways:

- parent questionnaires (including focussed questionnaire on diversity and inclusion 2022)
- Inclusion and belonging audit 2022 involving staff and governor representatives
- curriculum workshops, open to all parents for key skill areas (Maths, Reading, Phonics)
- class and whole school assemblies, embracing a breadth of cultures
- open sessions in all year groups for parents/carers/other relatives
- the school curriculum, designed to enable children to understand and respect diversity
- disability awareness sessions run for pupils through the curriculum.
- strong inclusion agenda through school improvement planning and governor monitoring
- developing an accessible site and adapted equipment
- working towards being a Rights Respecting school.
- direct contact with parents representing pupils with particular protected characteristics
- strong Young Governors and Class ambassador systems to support pupil voice.
- use of the 'House' system to promote community between different year groups in school.
- parenting support groups and advice sessions with Home School Link Worker and school nursing team.
- parent open sessions prior to Year 5 and 6 Relationships, Health and Sex Education curriculum.
- RE curriculum which includes learning about a range of faiths and other world views
- curriculum enhancement through projects about specific cultures/communities, drawing on pupil suggestions, own experiences, or those of their families, utilising personal links.
 Examples have included Y2 Kenya, Y6 Italy, RRR events, Fund raising (Comic and Sports Relief, Children in Need, Rainbow Centre, Socks for Syria), Shoebox appeal.
- Link with Hamble Heights care home and performance for retirement homes promoting links across generations.

Please note, data presented is most recent statutory assessment data from 2019 – no data from 2020 and 2021 due to Covid, and data for 2022 has not been published externally following disruption caused by pandemic.
